

Master of Arts (MA) - 2010

The Master of Arts is a one-year degree which may follow an initial year of postgraduate study in a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) or Postgraduate Diploma in Arts. You can develop exceptional transferable skills while increasing your understanding of your field.

Both Research Masters and Taught Masters options are available although for some subjects there is a research Masters only.

Master of Arts – Research Masters

The Research Masters consists of a thesis or research portfolio. For some subjects you may combine a shorter thesis with one or two taught courses. The Research Masters is completed on one year full-time study or up to two years of part-time study.

Master of Arts – Taught masters

The Taught Masters consists of postgraduate-level taught courses and often includes a dissertation or smaller research project. The taught Masters may be completed in one year of full-time study or up to four years part-time study.

The table indicates what subjects are available as part of the Research and Taught Master of Arts.
